The problem-solving approach also aids students in their specific majors through software applications requiring major-specific professional communication skills in written, graphical, and presentation forms

Course Objectives

After taking this course, you will walk away with strategies that allow you to address real world problems, and with the ability to support your problem-solving process using Excel for gathering, organizing and analyzing data, and Word and PowerPoint to communicate your solutions. This summer you will be formatting documents, gathering and analyzing data (using basic, medium and advance excel features), and creating a Power Point Presentation. All of these deliverables will be created in the context of who you are, where you want to work, and in general getting ready for that job you dream about. We will also analyze data that is relevant for your discipline.

Module 1: Documenting deliverables after a problem-solving process (Computational tool: MS Word)

Module 2: Problem-Solving and decision-making: Basic Data Analysis (Computational tools: MS Word, and MS Excel).

Module 3: Problem-Solving: Summarizing Data in Industry (Computational tools: MS Word, MS Excel)

Module 4: Analyzing trends in publicly available data (Computational tools: MS Excel)

Module 5: Professional presentations (Computational tool: MS word and Power Point)

Important note on submitting the wrong file version, files with virus or corrupt files:

We will not grade your assignment if it has virus, is corrupt in Canvas due to a malfunction of your computer or a network communication problem (when it is corrupt in Canvas, the document name starts with ~), or is not there. If one of these cases happens to your deliverable's assignment, it will not be graded, and you would receive 0 points in that assignment.

Please, help me and my team of peer mentors, and make sure that we can grade your assignment. These are some tips to avoid that situation: do not wait until the last minute to try to upload your assignments or take your quizzes (Battle Murphy's Law!), and instead:

- Make sure you have no virus
- 2. Upload your document early (you can submit your any assignment from day 1)

- 3. Log out, and log back in
- 4. Double check that your assignment is submitted!
- 5. Download your assignment and open it. Can you see it? If you can, there is a high probability that we can too.

We will only grade what is available in Canvas, and that was submitted through the assignment description section. Deliverables will not be accepted by the Canvas e-mail, by the regular e-mail, or by any other online sharing media.

We will only grade your last submission. For example, in assignment 1, you will need to submit 2 files, a Word document and an Excel document. The ideal scenario is that you submit both at the same time. If you make two submissions, one for each file, we will grade only one of these files, the one in the last submission. We will not grade files in previous submissions.

If your right submission is late (1 minute to 23:59 hours late, it will be graded with the late policy).

If the day after the due date you find out that your deliverable is corrupt in Canvas, you can still re-submit it and it will be graded with the Late policy.

Late policy

Late assignments will not be accepted for full credit.

We understand, sometimes life give us unexpected situations and it is impossible to get on top of our duties. Thinking that sometimes students for diverse reasons could miss one or more due dates, I have decided to give you the opportunity to get 50% of the points of the assignment if you submit it between 1 minute and 23:59 hours late. After that, it will not be accepted, and you will get 0 points in that assignment. For example, if the assignment is worth 15 points, and your grade in that assignment was 12, with the 50% discount (7.5 points) your grade would be 4.5.

Missing a Quiz due date?

Make sure that does not happen to you. In that quiz you will get 0 points, and there is no way you can take it past the deadline.

Is there any possibility of an Exception?

Yes, but exceptions to the late policy are only allowed per university policy
