FOUR WAYS TO TAKE ACTION NOW

- 1. Starting with your current semester's courses, make sure the **course syllabi** you upload to college websites are <u>accessible</u> PDFs
- 2. Ensure any new videos you produce have both captions and audio descriptions of what's happening on screen
- 3. Evaluate websites for timeliness and relevance as well as accessibility. Non-accessible web content can be retained as archives under certain conditions, but it might be easier/better to take it down.
- 4. Update your **faculty or lab website** content to <u>follow</u>
 <u>accessibility tips</u>: add image alt
 text and meaningful link text, make
 content scannable and readable
 by screen readers, improve color
 contrast, and more.

When:

Enforcement begins **April 24, 2026**

Where:

On all official UF websites (including college, faculty & lab websites)

Why:

Violating accessibility rules can lead to litigation & bad publicity - and providing web content that everyone can use is the right thing to do.

ACCESSIBLE WEB CONTENT HELPS EVERYONE

ACCESSIBLE CONTENT ISN'T JUST FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

ACCESSIBLE PDFs

Offer a better user experience on a variety of devices, and text can be copied and pasted

STYLED HEADINGS, BULLETED LISTS AND SIMPLE LANGUAGE

Support easier scanning and better information retention

VIDEO CAPTIONS AND DESCRIPTIONS

Allow watching in noisy or sound-prohibitive environments

IMAGE ALT TEXT

Provide image descriptions while loading on slow mobile networks

MEANINGFUL LINK TEXT

Let visitors know what they'll get when they tap or click (Protip: never use "click here" as link text)
