Two University of Delaware graduate students were injured September 26th, in a small lab explosion according to University of Delaware police.

Lessons Learned: It is imperative that all chemical waste containers are accurately labeled and properly stored to eliminate mixing of incompatible wastes. All laboratory staff must be trained in chemical waste management and thoroughly understand the waste streams generated from their experiments.
