# Activity # 5 – DIY Peppermint Slime

Making peppermint slime is a fun STEM activity that can be used in the holiday season.

Below is a simple recipe:

### Ingredients:

- 1 cup of white school glue
- 1 cup of shaving cream
- 1 teaspoon of baking soda
- 2 to 3 drops of peppermint extract (adjust to your preference)
- Red food coloring (optional, for a peppermint color)
- 1 tablespoon of contact lens solution (containing boric acid and sodium borate)
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon of glitter (optional)

## **Equipment:**

- Mixing bowl
- Spoon

### Instructions:

- 1. In a mixing bowl, combine a cup of white school glue and a cup of shaving cream. Stir them together with a spoon until well mixed.
- 2. Add 1 teaspoon of baking soda to the mixture and stir thoroughly. This helps give the slime its desired consistency.
- 3. Next, add 2 to 3 drops of peppermint extract to the mixture. Adjust the amount based on how strong you want the peppermint scent to be in the slime.
- 4. To get the red peppermint color, add 2 to 3 drops of red food coloring to the mixture. Stir until the color is completely dissolved.
- 5. Gradually add 1 tablespoon contact lens solution to the mixture, stirring continuously. Add it a little at a time until the slime starts to come together and pull away from the sides of the bowl.
- 6. Knead the slime with your hands until it reaches the desired consistency. If it is too sticky, you can add a little bit more contact lens solution.
- 7. Optionally, add glitter for a festive touch.
- 8. Once the slime is ready, have fun playing with it!
